

An Introduction to Javanese in Indonesia This blog will provide in-depth information on the culture, language, and history of the Javanese people in Indonesia. Javanese is one of the set of languages that are spoken in Southeast Asia. The others are Thai, Vietnamese, Burmese, etc. It's used by about 40 million people living in Java Island and is written with Latin characters. The history of this language dates back to fourth century AD when it was developed by Sanskrit together with Old Kawi script which was used for Hindu scriptures before the birth of Christ. It was formalized in the 12th century AD, when it was used as the official language of the Kingdom of Singhasari, which dominated Java at that time. The fact that Javanese is also used as a liturgical language for Hinduism and Buddhism may be very appealing to those who are interested in learning this language. The current version of Javanese is quite different from Old Kawi scripts because Old Kawi has vowel letters which are now combined into one or two consonants. Javanese can be compared to Bahasa Indonesia because they are both derived from Sanskrit words. But there are several differences between them. The most notable differences are that Bahasa Indonesia is derived from Malay language, while Javanese is not. Another thing to note is that the letters used in writing Javanese do not have associations with any alphabet. This means that the readers of Javanese must memorize it by heart. The sounds of this language are similar to that of Portuguese or Italian, but there are several differences as well. What makes it unique is its use of inflection which has two forms: active and passive moods. Javanese also has several types of pronouns like first person (I/me), second person (you), third person (he, she, it), fourth person (they or them). Javanese has a lot of words borrowed from Sanskrit which is the main reason why Javanese is very closely related to Sanskrit. Javanese is written using a mixture of Arabic, Latin and "kawi" letters. Javanese has a lot of loanwords that come from Chinese, Arabic, and Sanskrit. The process of learning this language is considered hard because it does not have an alphabet system. To write the letter yan it must be memorized by heart.

(\*) = The letter "y" for this language is called "yan" but in other languages it may be different, for example: yn or jn or xn etc.

A brief outline of the history of this language.

To write the sound 'a' in Javanese there are two different ways, first is using three letters "daan" or "daan" and the second is using one letter "da" or "da". There are four basic vowels which are represented by the word like like like like (always together) (e.g). The first vowel of Javanese is represented by the three words "a", followed by any of the four words that means 'not' or 'nothing' (e.g), e.g. Ta da Pa. Pa da Ta, etc. And like like like (always together) (e.g).

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
