The others are Thai, Vietnamese, Burmese, etc. It's used by about 40 million people living in Java Island and is written with Latin characters. The history of this language dates back to fourth century AD when it was developed by Sanskrit together with Old Kawi script which was used as the official language of the Kingdom of Singhasari, which dominated Java at that time. The fact that Javanese is also used as a liturgical language for Hinduism and Buddhism may be very appealing to those who are interested in learning this language. The current version of Javanese is quite different from Old Kawi scripts because Old Kawi has vowel letters which are now combined into one or two consonants. Javanese is not. Another thing to note is that the letters used in writing Javanese of Javanese must memorize it by heart. The sounds of this language are similar to that of Portuguese or Italian, but there are several differences as well. What makes it unique is its use of inflection which has two forms; active and passive moods. Javanese also has several types of pronouns like first person (I/me), second person (you), third person (ke, she, it), fourth person (key or them). Javanese has a lot of loanwords that come from Chinese, Arabic, and Sanskrit. The process of learning this language is considered hard because it does not have an alphabet system. To write the letters yan it must be memorized by heart.

(*) = The letter "y" for this language is called "yan" but in other languages it may be different, for example: yn or jn or xn etc.

A brief outline of the history of this language.

To write the sound 'a' in javanese there are two different ways, first is using three letters "daan" or "daan" and the second is using one letter "da" or "da". There are four basic vowels which are represented by the three words "ta", followed by any of the four words that means 'not' or 'nothing' (e.g). e.g. Ta da Pa, Pa da Ta, etc. And like like like like (always together) (e.g).

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
